The members of the Committee thanked Mr. Potteiger for coming in to interview tonight. The Committee members enjoyed interviewing him. Mr. Potteiger is new to Osterville in 2021, his grandfather was a drummer, he played for Chatham Bars Inn, he saved his money from that and they were able to buy land in Osterville. He feels a past connection to the past and his history, and wants to

get involved in his community, his background is in the tech world, and believes this experience could be beneficial. He lived in Cambridge for a brief time and was involved in the Planning Committees there, and is very eager to learn new things. Consensus is a process, but to listen to the rules and regulations the Committee operates under and to understand them and then put other ideas that people may have and incorporate those into a solution for all. The Appointments Committee members mentioned that if he was not considered for the Planning Board that he may want to look at other Committees to serve on. The Committee members liked his enthusiasm in becoming a member on a Committee as he just moved here a while ago and would like to make his community better and if he can serve on a Committee to do that it would be great. The Chair the Committee explained that there was a Local Comprehensive Planning Committee put together to look at the long range planning in Barnstable, and he could possible look for those meetings and attend as a resident during Public Comment, and also there is still an opening on the Zoning Board of Appeals if he was interested in that he could come back in July for an interview, as well as on the Comprehensive Financial Advisory Committee.

Mr. Teague grew up on the Cape and has lived in both Barnstable and Yarmouth, graduated from Dennis Yarmouth, served the Country in the Army Corp of Engineers, he owns a building company in

West Dennis that has built over 1500 homes on the Cape, he was on the Planning Board from 2008 to 2014 and three of those years he was Chair, he believes his expertise in building would greatly help the Planning Board, he knows the very thick and cumbersome zoning areas and regulations that are here on the Cape, and feels that that knowledge is beneficial, he has recently moved back into Barnstable. He has a passion for serving his community, and would like the opportunity to do this. He has worked on a number of projects outside of Barnstable, but feels that the same type of models would work here as well. He believes that housing is an issue no matter where you live but particularly hard here on the Cape because of the area and the surround protections we all need to pay attention to. Consensus is difficult to achieve if it's all one sided, so both sides and all opinions matter. Housing on the Cape is a challenge due to the restrictions we have in place with water sheds and nitrogen loading; he is a big supporter of Smart Growth Development Programs that have been around for a number of years, much of that is in place already, the challenge is creating equity in housing, the ADU program is a beneficial one, which is the main reason I left Barnstable, and moved to Yarmouth because I was able to buy a home with an ADU and gain equity. Barnstable's biggest problem is wastewater, even though Barnstable is ahead on this, we are always going to be chasing it, so building is an issue and will be an issue for the long term because of the wastewater issues.

The Committee members thanked him for his interview and applying again for consideration on the Planning Board.

Dear Members of the Town Council:

I would like to apply for appointment to a board, commission or committee of the Town of Barnstable. I have attached an Application Form, resume and additional summary of qualifications.

I would like to be appointed to the Planning Board, Economic Development Commission (or its successor), the Zoning Board of Appeals, or the Historical Commission, in that order of preference.

My wife and I have lived in Barnstable since 2013. We became full-time residents in December of 2018 upon my retirement as a judge of the Superior Court of California in Sacramento. Prior to that time, we were part-time residents four to six weeks per year.

I was a Superior Court judge for ten years. I served in the Felony Trial Division, the Juvenile Delinquency Division, and the Appellate Division (concurrent with assignment to felony trials.). I was appointed by Governor Schwarzenegger in 2008 to fill an unexpired term. I subsequently was elected in my own right to a six year term in 2010, and re-elected for an additional six year term in 2016.

Prior to being appointed to the Superior Court, I was an Assistant United States Attorney and Senior Trial Attorney for the United States Department of Justice in Washington, D.C. and Sacramento, California for approximately 25 years.

I was the United States Attorney for the Eastern District of California during a portion of the Clinton Administration. The Eastern District of California includes 34 of California's 58 counties, and extends from the Oregon border to the Los Angeles County line, and from the Coastal Mountain Range to the Nevada state line. The population while I was in the office was approximately 7,600,000 permanent residents.

United States Attorney is at federal paygrade ES-IV, which is the grade of an Assistant Secretary of Defense, or Assistant Secretary of State, or other federal cabinet level department, or General Counsel of the Department of Defense, or Department of State, or Assistant Attorney General of the Criminal, Civil or Tax Divisions of the Department of Justice.

In addition to serving as the United States Attorney, I also held Senior Executive Service ("SES") positions as the First Assistant U.S. Attorney, Executive Assistant U.S. Attorney, Chief of Organized Crime, Narcotics and Violent Crime, Chief of National Security and Anti-Terrorism, and Senior Litigation Counsel.

I served in the United States Army for over 20 years, four of which were on active duty and 16 plus of which were in the reserve component. I served as a trial judge in the U.S. Army Trial Judiciary for eight years, and I taught Criminal Trial Advocacy on the faculty of the U.S. Army Judge Advocate General's School for eight years. Prior to law school and entry onto active duty in the Army, I was a field agent with the Internal Revenue Service in Boston for more than three years.

A long time ago, before I went on active duty in the Army, I lived in Hyannis and worked at the [now closed] Howard Johnson's restaurant on Main Street. I also worked at Pancake Man in Dennisport, and was a police officer for the Town of Dennis.

Housing here on the Cape is a challenging one, what may work in other Communities may not necessarily work here, just like Mr. Twiss said our wastewater is our biggest issue, and how do you do growth with that. One of the biggest discussions is density and how to work around that, we do have a lot of Commercial buildings we should be looking at and be going up, any new growth Commercial should be looking at that as well, the other issue right now id building costs, there is not any incentives for individuals that want to either add on to an existing home, or an addition is very costly and really undermining the goals we have. Wastewater is going to be our biggest challenge moving forward and we need to balance that with new growth and housing, but come up with creative thinking and different ways of doing it.

He feels that he has enough knowledge of aviation to become an active member on the Airport Commission. Since retiring in June of 2021 he has missed the flying portion of his job, but he was forced to retire because of the regulations on Commercial pilots, that once you reach a certain age, they ask you to retire; not really ready to do that he thought his expertise in aviation would be beneficial to the members on the Airport Commission.

Chair of the Committee expressed how much our Airport has grown under the direction of Katie Servis, the Airport Manager, she is a valuable asset to the Town, and has really tried to bring people into the Airport to experience all it has to offer.

Chair of the Committee asked for any discussion regarding the applicants who were interviewed tonight and asked if anyone would like to make any motions for the Planning Board.

Councilor Shaughnessy thought the individuals they interviewed tonight have a lot of desire to serve the Town in whatever capacity they can, and we should be grateful for that. We have a very talented pool of individuals that come before us hoping to serve on a Committee and that should be commended. Chair of Committee would like to see Mr. Teague become a member on one of our Committees, he speaks to us with a lot of compassion and great ideas that we need to channel, and we should use his talents somewhere. Councilor Neary recommended Mr. Teague serve on the Planning Board in 2019, but unfortunately he did not get the number of votes needed to advance to the next step, but agrees with Councilor Cullum, that he has the energy and passion and truly care about Barnstable, with that being said, Councilor Neary and Councilor Shaughnessy and Councilor Starr felt that the two individuals currently up for reappointment have extensive resume's as well as 3 years' experience on a Board that is a regulatory board; and to change that in any way with the Zoning that is currently before the Planning Board or for those that come in the future, these regulatory boards need the experience and the knowledge moving forward, and feel that the two individuals should continue, Chair of Committee agreed that their resumes are very impressive and we are very lucky to have this type of talent and knowledge on the Planning Board. Chair of the Committee asked the Appointment Committee members if anyone would like to make a motion. Councilor Shaughnessy made the motion to recommend to the full Council Mr. Twiss and Mr. Sexton be reappointed as regular members to the Planning Board to a term expiring 06/2025. This was seconded by Councilor Gordon Starr; Administrative Assistant Kelly Crahan took a Roll Call vote of the members.
